STANDARDS IN PUBLIC LIFE: WHAT ARE THEY, AND WHY DO THEY MATTER?

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Standards in public life are essential to the health of the democratic system, and to public confidence in it. They protect decision-making, underpin political stability, and help to maintain public trust.

Standards in public life are expressed through a series of codified values, laws, rules and conventions, which express shared expectations about the boundaries of appropriate political behaviour. They regulate the roles of political actors, limit the influence of outside interests, and more broadly help to define a healthy political culture.
